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# RICK-AND-MORTAR

**REVIEW / STATE OF PLAY** — Arizona an organization in a perpetual state of rebuilding made significant personnel changes that will alter the culture significantly. They have not made the playoffs in five seasons finishing with the third worst record in the league.

Change begins at the top with new President and CEO Steve Patterson. He brings NFL and NBA experience and was appointed after **Andrew Barroway** bought the team outright after working with nine co-owners for the past few years. This should provide some singular focus and a committed management with a new arena a dominant issue. Uncertain management has hindered the organization in the past.

General Manager **John Chayka** was promoted to President of Hockey Operations and General Manager. A strong show of faith in the young man, in particular with the departure of long time coach Dave Tippett, who had a strong influence on the organization.

Chayka tapped past Coyote **Rick Tocchet** as the new head coach after winning the cup twice with the Penguins. In Pittsburgh he oversaw the forwards and the power play and wants to emphasize speed and offense around his skill players. He has an impressive stable of young talent to work with and is looking to unleash their creativity and aggressiveness.

Other changes included parting ways awkwardly with Shane Doan after a 21-year career with the franchise. Leading scorer Radim Vrbata left in free agency. Goalie Mike Smith was traded to the Calgary Flames as a precursor to a busy draft day with two significant trades to boost both offense and defense.

**AGGRESSIVE OFFSEASON ACQUISITIONS** — Stalwart defender and premier shot blocker 6'3" **Niklas Hjalmarsson** was acquired from Chicago and the 10 year veteran provides a stabilizing presence on a blueline that allowed the second most shots against in the NHL last season. It is anchored by fellow Swede and superstar Oliver Ekman-Larsson who was hampered by a broken thumb without missing any time last season and will return to elite level with an improved supporting cast. Surprising rookie **Jakob Chychrun** played solid defense at 19-years old, while 31-year old Alex Goligoski turned in a solid season with 36 points.

Trading their seventh overall pick to the New York Rangers plus Anthony DeAngelo they acquired a number one center in Derek Stepan and their starting goalie for next season in **Antti Raanta**. It is his first shot at carrying the load for a team, but appeared in 30 games with the Rangers last season with impressive stats (2.26 GAA, 0.922 SV%).

**ONE STEP AT A TIME FOR YOUNG FORWARDS** — Stepan should provide a catalyst for budding superstar **Max Domi** and allow him to hit career numbers in his third season. The 27-year old provides further leadership and is a consistent producer (four consecutive seasons between 53 and 57 points) and responsible defensively. He will be a fixture on both the powerplay and penalty kill.

Beyond Stepan the forward group will be relying upon a very young group. **Christian Dvorak** made the jump from prolific offense with the London Knights in the OHL to appear in 78 games in his rookie season. He will be asked to center the second line. He will likely be flanked by a couple of 24 year olds in newly acquired Nick Cousins and reliable **Tobias Reider**. Skilled youngsters include **Brendan Perlini** (21) who made the jump to the NHL last season and **Anthony Duclair** (21) who endured a miserable season in both the NHL and AHL after firing 20 goals as a rookie along with 6'4 inch 21-year old **Lawson Crouse**. He appeared in 72 games as a rookie and is projected as a power forward, but had little offensive impact last season. He will compete for a role in the bottom six as well.

Rookies that should make an impact include skilled 18-year old **Clayton Keller** and 20-year old **Dylan Strome** who looked strong in the development camp. With a new coach in Tocchet how he deploys the youngsters is hard to predict and will create fierce competition in camp to determine the extent of their roles.

**OUTLOOK** — Arizona emerged out of the off-season with a meaningfully improved team in adding Stepan and Hjalmarsson while giving up Connor Murphy from their lineup. The loss of Shane Doan's leadership will be an interesting development to watch. Not all of the kids are going to make an impact and more moves to add experience may be in order for Chayka if the waters are rough early, and the youngsters begin to get frustrated. They should all continue to develop, but that process will need to be handled with care and could mean they are a season or three away.

## PLAYERS TO WATCH

**Christian Dvorak** — Upgraded supporting cast bodes well for the former London Knight - and his surge up the production charts.

**Clayton Keller** — Injects creativity, imagination and youthful exuberance into a lineup desperately searching for solutions to scoring goals.

Scouting: Poised and creative playmaker with soft hands, who can utilize mid-sized frame to dart into heavy patrolled areas .. strong and balanced on a wide base, aside from a slushy start up and efficient stride that lacks explosiveness with good cruising speed .. shields the puck well and adept at creating plays in traffic .. deceptively skilled and unpredictable in an unflashy way .. difficult to read when carrying the puck, offering few tells and disguising intentions .. patient in scoring areas - well-prepared with stick and body .. could be more assertive with a good hard wristshot - and make quicker decisions .. gets stuck on the puck sometimes as openings appear .. plays a methodical two-way game, guided by solid positional sense .. takes smart checking angles - gets to loose pucks simply by being in the right place.

Analysis: Traded to the Arizona Coyotes at the NHL Entry Draft, coming off a fourth consecutive mid-50's finish in points, playing almost full schedule, sitting out one game .. a four-game point streak in Q4 ended a 29-game funk with only one goal - and a reason for the reduction in goals .. decline was at 5v5 - spent most with Mats Zuccarello and Chris Kreider (509 mins, 57.9 GF% & 54.9 CF%) or Rick Nash and Jimmy Vesey (224 mins, 55 GF% & 50.1 CF%) .. career highs in 5v4 points, and pts/60 by only a small margin .. steps into the 1C role immediately, expect more in the mid-50's.

Scouting: An offensive dynamo, prodigy of Tie Domi, is a dynamic skater - light and explosive with sharp lateral agility .. stride is compact and powerful, generates tremendous quickness in crossovers powering an elite top gear and superb pivoting ability .. shifty and highly-skilled possession, with a repertoire of slick skating moves and puckhandling tricks.. stays low to the ice and is always selling head fakes and dekes to confuse the opposition .. small in stature yet extremely tough to knock off the puck due to exceptional balance and strength on his skates .. a force in down-low situations and especially along the boards, deadly in the slot .. better utilizes linemates .. playmaking patience is developing, yet can still be guilty of over-handling the puck and dead-ending himself .. shows a hunger for the puck in the offensive zone - and solid physical intensity - which is usually not matched in defensive pursuits .. can lose enthusiasm when plays diffuse - and shows little interest getting back and covering his man.

Analysis: Scored his first goal 11 games into the season and put up five more in the following 15 when a hand injury requiring surgery cost him 23 games, courtesy of a rare fight with Calgary's Garnet Hathaway .. would score only four times upon return - with a drop in shot rates from 2.23 pre-injury to 1.5 afterwards, amid a dive in

Coyotes shot rates over the second half .. led the team in 5v5 Pts/60, despite a 33% drop in shooting percentage from his rookie campaign .. scored only three 5v4 points after injury return, three in the final five games .. injury concerns aside, there are career highs on the horizon.

Scouting: Smart, skilled playmaker with good size and keen hockey sense .. skating lacks explosiveness - mechanics appear a touch stiff in parts - yet uses his power efficiently and sustains a steady high stride tempo .. skilled and savvy with the puck, makes clever shifts to create lanes and openings - with slick passing ability, including finding lanes that don't initially appear to be there .. best weapon though is a heavy wristshot, featuring a sneaky and reflexive shooting release .. alert and hard-working away from the puck, excellent in support and quick on assignments .. applies backside pressure, feet always moving, an impressive understanding of a complete two-way game .. upgrades in strength have factored prominently in his rise - translating into improved speed and physical play .. transforming into a solid penalty killer.

Analysis: Assigned to Tucson twice early in the season .. scored four goals over a disappointing first half (45-4-9-13) .. placed on a line with Shane Doan and newly recalled Brendan Perlini (292 mins, 66.7 GF% & 47.6 CF%) finishing strong (33-11-9-20, firing 22% at 5v5) prompting a 30% increase in on-ice shot metrics with a noticeable jump in individual scoring chance generation rates .. Q3/Q4 high shooting percentage could be a bit of a red flag on sustainability .. secondary 5v4 minutes featured a team high points on 83.33% of on-ice goals scored - 66.67% primary points .. second-most among rookies faceoff wins (471) .. only player with a positive plus/minus (plus-7) .. scoring crown challenger under the right circumstances .. exciting upside here.

Scouting: Undersized, skilled winger with keen instincts .. low hunched over skater, gets quick bursts and adequate first step quickness, but lacks top end speed .. jumps off his blades sometimes on crossovers and lateral shifts, yet good on his edges, with a wide stance in cruising speed that fends off errant sticks in pursuit and in close .. hands aren't exceptionally quick or deceptive, but can fire pucks with minimal windup that are more accurate than hard .. excels in-tight around the net .. gets lost in soft areas and pouncing with quick strikes .. takes up good support positions defensively, but can also be an effective F1 on the forecheck .. utilitarian that can be used up and down the lineup.

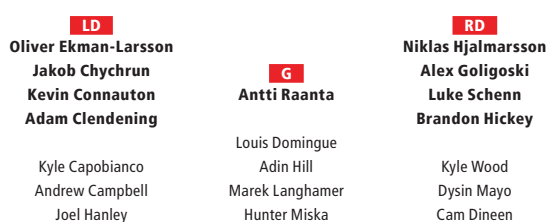
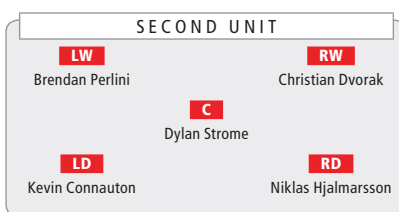
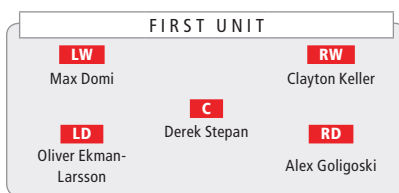
Metrics:

Analysis: Doubled his Q1 expected goals (3.5) en route to seven goals in the first 22 games that included two missed games with lower body injury .. scored once in the next 21, and eight in the next 29, ending the season pointless in the last eight games .. points aside, the underlying shot metrics at 5v5 weren't bad, with his individual metrics outpacing the declining team metrics - teaming at 5v5 with Jordan Martinook and Brendan Perlini - his most stable linemates all season .. traditionally low amount of penalties, put up six penalty minutes in '16-7 .. may lack upper echelon creativity to remain on scoring units, but could still hit that elusive 20-goal mark if his individual shot rates return to the 189 level of previous two seasons.

**Analysis:** Played most of the season with a broken thumb, suffered on November 29 but never missed any time .. produced career low G/60 at 5v5 – with career low ish% - and 5v4 as a result .. failed to score a goal in 22 games after potting five goals in the first seven out of the gate .. followed by a 21 game funk from February until mid-March .. depressed shot metrics across the board, but drop in points primarily precipitated by a reduction in personal shot attempt events, both at even strength and at 5v4 .. partnered most with now departed Connor Murphy (481 mins, 39.5 GF% & 47.7 CF%) over the first half, and then switched with Luke Schenn (655 mins, 45.7 GF% & 42.9 CF%) .. perennial leader among defensemen goal scorers fired full season career low, with an almost 40% reduction in shot attempts at 5v4 by the team as a whole while on the ice .. bounce-back to elite level will depend on better supporting cast.

**Scouting:** A smooth puckmoving rearguard with keen instincts and good feet .. sneaky on outlets, deciphers pressure well and delivers soft feeds .. lacks explosive footspeed and some backward mobility, yet moves well laterally and is always in control thanks to a wide, balanced stride .. pinpoint one-timer or a quick wrist shot, has a knack for getting pucks to the net .. intuitive – quick to spot openings and pinch to the net .. not overly big or strong and can be guilty of soft defensive marking .. can be turnstiled if gap is too wide .. must focus on positioning as he gets caught flat-footed 1-on-1 .. thrives when jumping up and supporting the rush and at the point in the offensive zone, an aging blueliner with future game skills.

**Analysis:** A solid presence and bright spot on the squad .. heated up over the second half (38-5-18-23) after scoring only once prior to February 9th .. contributed to career-high 40.7% 5v5 goals scored, following rises in shot and expected goals rates over Q3 and Q4. performed best slotted with lower roster lines, rather than scoring lines, a point to remember as a depth defenseman .. split time with Michael Stone (481 mins, 42.4 GF% & 42.7 CF%) and Conor Murphy (351 mins, 41.7 GF% & 45.5 CF%) .. skated over 1400 mins in three straight seasons, with exemplary durability, missing three games in the last five seasons .. mid-30s scoring range is adequate for the veteran.

**Scouting:** An imposing defender with size, speed and hockey sense .. remarkably agile and coordinated for his size, a superb skater with crisp acceleration and exceptional lateral agility – a trait that will translate well in the quicker NHL .. can spearhead a rush and loves to push the pace

with the puck .. excels in transition, making qualified first passes or gaining the zone all on his own .. stretched his boundaries in a baptism by fire, increasingly accepting of challenges and working through pro level struggles .. has a good touch backing up in the neutral zone, and making attempts to close the gap in an effort to knock pucks loose of onrushing forwards .. needs to continue to simplify his approach and should be fine with additional coaching .. a complementary first pairing defenseman.

**Analysis:** Surprised all by making the team following his draft year as an 18 year old .. led Coyotes blueliners in shot attempts and shots/60, involved in 56.3% of the on-ice 5v5 goals scored .. led the blueline in 5v5 Pts/60 and primary Pts/60 (0.67) .. missed 13 games as a healthy scratch, including two, four-game stretches .. second four-gamer led to a drop in on-ice shooting metrics over Q4 partnered up with Anthony DeAngelo (139 mins, 22.2 GF% & 42.6 CF%) .. experimented with late season 5v4 time – averaging 1:11/gm in Q4 (1-1-2) .. finished the season with one assist in the last 11 games .. rookie learning curve aside, with some coaxing, could see a jump in points to the 30's.

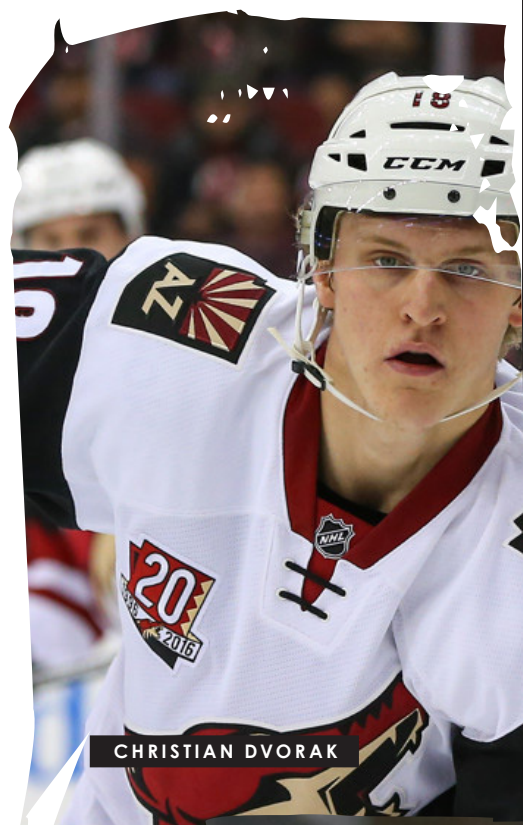

**Scouting:** Not an imposing goaltender physically he relies on solid positioning and athleticism to limit opportunities .. owns excellent agility and quickness, quick feet and an active glove .. makes up for size as a spirited competitor and aggressive in both protecting his crease, clearing his sight lines, and challenging shooters .. possesses excellent balance and maintains his positioning while still remaining nimble .. technically strong sealing the ice on low shots and remaining in control .. durability remains to be seen with only 94 NHL games to date over four seasons.

**Analysis:** Rangers back up appeared in 30 games last season in support of Henrik Lundqvist and posted a sparkling 0.922 SV% and a 2.26 save percentage – he was terrific on the road with even better numbers (1.99 GAA, 0.935 SV%) and earning 12 of his 16 wins .. that was the most games he had played in four NHL seasons .. GM Chayka has declared him his number one to start the season, but his ability to manage the grind of 60 games remains to be seen .. he finished the season strongly starting nine games in March (9-4-3-2, 2.08 GAA, 0.927 SV%) .. he is ably backed up by Louis Domingue who started 31 games last season and could challenge for the crease .. playing behind Arizona's defense (2nd most shots against in the NHL) will make him nostalgic for Broadway .. not a lock for number one and you should draft cautiously as a result.

# PROSPECTS

## SYSTEM OVERVIEW

As one of the first teams to whole-heartedly embrace analytics as a driving factor in team building, the Coyotes have been a fascinating case study on how to acquire prospects under the new-aged rubrics.

The analytics era in Arizona can be directly traced to the hiring of John Chayka as General Manager in May 2016, approximately one month prior to the 2016 Entry Draft. Between his two draft classes, the Coyotes have added 14 players to the system, five in his first go round and nine this summer. It is clearly too early to come to any sort of conclusion, but there are some patterns that can be discerned in the tea leaves.

Before we look too closely into the Chayka drafts, we should recap how the team had previously made their selections, as a number of players featured on their top 20 are from previous draft classes. In the two draft classes before Chayka (BC), the Coyotes selected 18 players, 11 of whom were taken out of the CHL, three out of the US National Development Program, and the other four all out of Sweden. The forwards all had two-way ability in addition to above average offensive production as juniors, while the defensemen were rarely drafted at all – only three in the last two years of BC drafting.

Looking at that last note, it seems that one of the first commitments of the Analysts Draft (AD) era in Arizona has been to add positional balance to the system, using nine of the first 14 AD picks on blueliners. With one very notable exception, the forwards drafted have been as noteworthy for their unrealized tools as for previous production.

As for the AD defensemen drafted, they can be characterized by above average skating at minimum, relatively mature hockey sense and, like their forward brethren, toolsiness. It is still too early to analyze the Coyotes' AD strategy for goalie development, as they had not drafted any, but have acquired two from the collegiate ranks, one as a free agent and one in trade for one of the forwards drafted BC. AD drafts have also stuck with Sweden as the only geographical talent overseas from which they have selected, which could be a function of available scouts, but is more likely a matter of small sample sizes. That said, they have been very open to

drafting from lower profile amateur leagues in North America, having selected players from the OJHL, MJHL, and CCHL, in addition to the non-USNTDP portion of the USHL, demonstrating a belief in player characteristics being able to trump the more easily projectable numbers accrued in the well-scouted CHL leagues.

As a result of these four draft classes, both BC and AD, as well as the other means of prospect acquisition employed by both regimes, the Coyotes have a system mixed with both past production and projections for future production. The team has high end athleticism as well as heightened hockey sense. For an organization whose NHL roster is still being roughed into shape, there will be a lot of options available internally depending on how specific players develop in juniors, college, Europe or the AHL and how openings arise at the NHL level. At least a few spots should open up this year, which leads us to the two players most likely to gobble them up.
